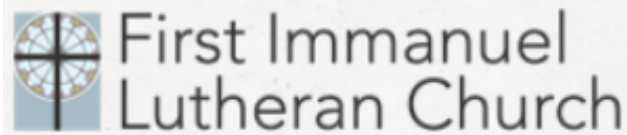

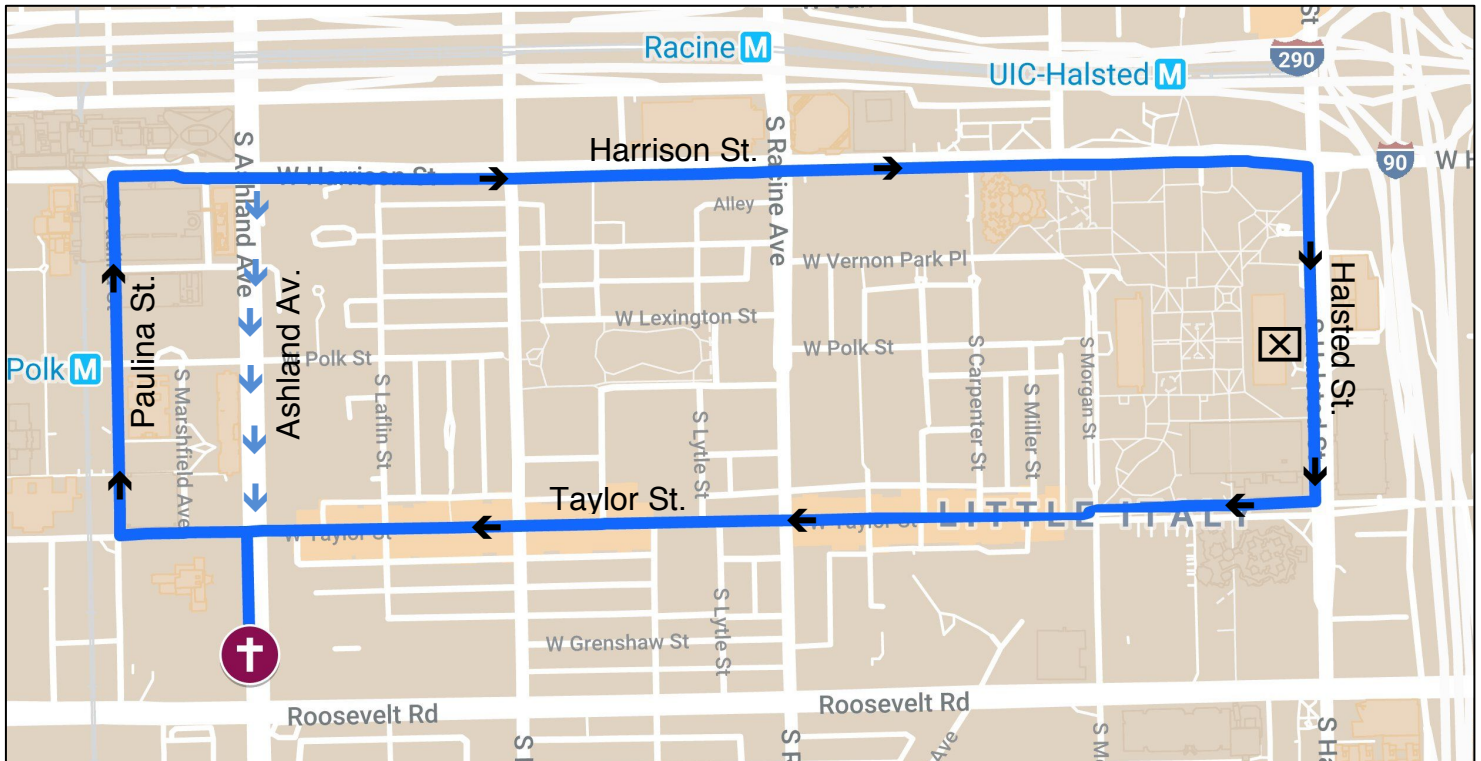

As you take in the sights of the day:

- Walk only on designated sidewalks
- Obey traffic signals
- Make way for bikes on your left
- Place trash in receptacles
- Please refill water bottles on-route
- Let others know about CROP Walk goals
- Call 773-609-0036 with emergencies
- Help end hunger one step at a time!

There are two routes: the 5K & the 1M. The 5K is a rectangle with Taylor on the south, Paulina on the west, Harrison on the north, and Halsted on the east. The 1M goes the same route as the 5K until Harrison and Ashland, when it turns south on Ashland and returns to the church, marked by the light-colored arrows. All walkers should stay on the sidewalk along the right side of the street (going with traffic), except after the step-off when we all leave the church and head north on Ashland Ave. crossing Taylor and then turning left (west). The halfway point is the UIC Student Center, marked on the map with an , with a rest area, bathrooms, and water fountains.
